Our Board of Education 🕳

Members of the Asheboro City Board of Education are elected by registered voters residing in the school district. Members serve six-year terms on a staggered basis so that no more than four positions will expire every two years. Elections are nonpartisan and are held at the time of the November general election in odd-numbered years.

The role of the Board can be summarized in the following areas:

- To provide vision and direction for the school system
- To create policies in accordance with state law that establish standards, accountability and evaluation of essential operations of the school district
- To prepare the budget for presentation to the county commissioners
- To hire, support and evaluate the superintendent
- To advocate for the school district, staff and especially the students in all interactions with other governmental entities and the public

Honoring Dr. Diane Frost

The 2013-2014 school year marked the final year Dr. Diane Frost served Asheboro City Schools as superintendent. Frost was employed by the district since 1991 and served as associate superintendent for curriculum and instruction prior to her appointment as superintendent. Dr. Frost served a total of 37 years in public education.



Hallmarks of her Asheboro City Schools legacy include:

- Community engagement in strategic planning
- Implemented nationally accredited pre-kindergarten and family literacy program
- Equipped all classrooms across the district with 21st century technology
- Implemented high school reform initiatives, including 9th grade academy, AHS Zoo School, and NOVA Academy, and expanded advanced placement and online courses
- Developed and implemented local Teacher Leadership Academy

Welcoming Dr. Terry Worrell

Dr. Worrell joined Asheboro City Schools as superintendent on July 1, 2014 with more than 33 years of experience in education. She began her career in the classroom, teaching physical science and health classes before spending 17 years as a principal at all levels – elementary, middle and high school. She served as regional superintendent in Guilford County, where she oversaw the largest region with 42 schools



and 19,000 students. She also served as assistant superintendent for curriculum and instruction in Rockingham County.


During her tenure as superintendent of the central region in Guilford County, Dr. Worrell was instrumental in improving student achievement, procuring prestigious grants, turning around struggling schools, and implementing The Middle College at UNCG High School and The STEM Early College at NC A&T State University. In only a short time in Rockingham County, she left a lasting impression; she helped lead the district to higher AYP results and spearheaded the design and implementation of the Rockingham Early College High School.

Most recently, Dr. Worrell worked for North Carolina New Schools, a nonprofit organization focused on developing high-performing schools and districts, where she served as senior director for district services. In that role, she led the development of district strategies focused on the implementation of a continuous improvement approach to education innovation. She led the organization's efforts to apply for the recently awarded \$20 million federal grant to develop innovative approaches to improve student achievement and boost graduation rates.

The board continues to be confident that Dr. Worrell's vast experience, in addition to her passion and dedication to student learning, will greatly serve the Asheboro students, staff and community leading Asheboro City Schools to even greater success.





2013-2014 Expenditures by Purpose


